

Purpose:

Following the 2010 Census release of Population and Housing data, Howard County must redraw council district boundaries to reflect population changes and shifts which have been identified as the result of the Year 2010 Census data findings. Article II, Section 202(f) of the Howard County Charter requires that the Council appoint a Councilmanic Redistricting Commission by April 1st of the year after each decennial census date. The Commission is charged with the responsibility of submitting a report to the County Council recommending the establishment of new councilmanic boundaries.

Howard County Population:

The 2010 Census has Howard County's population at approximately 286,669, up 15.8% from the 2000 Census figures. Howard County's percentage of population growth for the 2010 Census was the 7th largest in the State of Maryland. In fact, of the top five largest counties in Maryland (not including Baltimore City), Howard County had the largest percentage of population growth.

The average or "ideal" population for each council district in the County is approximately 57,334 people per district, resulting in an even distribution of the total population. Countywide, Population growth has been fairly even, with District 5 having the largest percent change at +22.3% and District 2 having the smallest percent change at +5%. It is typically acceptable for the population to be +/- 5% above or below the ideal population. The chart below shows the population percentage above/below the ideal district population. There are three districts (1, 3, and 5) that are outside of the acceptable +/- 5% standard. Therefore, council district boundary lines must be adjusted countywide to even out the population growth.

Process:

In a seven month period of time, the Commission met a total of five times (April 11th, June 20th, September 8th, September 26th, and October 5th), held three public hearings (May 24th, June 13th, and September 21st), heard testimony from many citizens (Appendix B), and deliberated over a

total of 15 different proposals (Appendix A) before forwarding the enclosed plan to the County Council.

Goals:


Council districts should be compact, contiguous, substantially equal in population, and have common interest as a result of geography, occupation, history, or existing boundaries.

Recommendation:

On October 5, 2011, the 2011 Howard County Redistricting Commission approved, by a 4-3 vote the 2011 Howard County Redistricting Commission Redistricting Plan. Below you will find the post redistricting numbers. The distribution of population range has been reduced to less than 5% plus or minus, while taking into consideration the preservation of communities.






Following each decennial census release of population and housing data, Howard County must draw new Council Districts to reflect population changes. Article II, Section 202(f) of the Howard County Code requires that the Council appoint by April 1st of the year after each decennial census date, a Councilmanic Redistricting Commission.

The Commission includes seven members: three members named by the Central Committees of each political party that polled at least 25 of the total vote for the Office of the County Executive in the last preceding general election and a Chairperson, all appointed by the County Council.

By October 15th of the year in which the Commission is appointed, the Commission is to present a councilmanic redistricting plan to the County Council. Within 30 days of receiving the redistricting plan, the Council will hold a public hearing on the plan. If by March 15th of the year after submission of the plan, no redistricting ordinance has been enacted, then the Redistricting Commission's plan becomes law.

Council districts should be compact, contiguous, substantially equal in population, and have common interest as a result of geography, occupation, history, or existing boundaries. The Board of Supervisors of Elections is to take any necessary steps to implement any such revisions of the Council District Boundaries that are adopted.
